# NEXT PROGRAM, July 26th...



Dr. Richard Bailey, a native of Montgomery, began his study of local history at the Alabama Department of Archives and History as a Kansas State University intern in August 1979. He remained at the archives for 15 months to conduct research for his dissertation. He received the BS and MEd degrees

from Alabama State University; MA from Clark Atlanta University; and PhD from Kansas State University. A joint fellowship from Cleveland (OH) State University and the University of Massachusetts enabled him to travel and study in Europe and Africa.

Bailey is the author of two books. The Montgomery Advertiser enclosed a 20-page excerpt from They Too Call Alabama Home: African American Profiles, 1800–1999 for Black History Month in 2012. His Neither Carpetbaggers nor Scalawags: Black Officeholders during the Reconstruction of Alabama, 1867–1878 was adopted by the Alabama State Textbook Committee and is now in its fifth edition. During the 1990s Alabama Public Television interviewed him for its broadcast of the 1961 Freedom Rides and for its segment on lynching. He was interviewed for PBS' "The Black Church: This Is Our Story, This Is Our Song," which aired February 16–17, 2021. His city-sponsored documentary, "Downtown Montgomery, Alabama: Mark of Distinction" (2019), and its 2020 spinoff, "Moments in Montgomery History," currently air on Troy University Television's Channel 181. He also appears on radio and television to discuss historical and current events.

Dr. Bailey has conducted several local tours beginning in February 1985. He has also led walking tours of Dexter Avenue, Commerce Street, and other historic downtown areas as well as Oakwood and Lincoln Cemeteries. The *Montgomery Advertiser* named him "Community Hero" for February 2021. He will speak on "A Historic View of Dexter Avenue."

# July 19th Meeting...



Our Rotary speaker on July 19 was club member Scott Gregory, who is the executive director for Montgomery Habitat for Humanity. He has held the position since March 1, 2020.

Gregory says just as he was starting in his new position, the COVID-19 pandemic hit, forcing plans to change. But what

has remained the same is the commitment to provide affordable housing for people that his organization serves, either by building homes or rehabilitating existing homes.

Gregory says the Montgomery Habitat for Humanity got its start in 1987 and has helped 85 area families so far. While some homes are scattered around, others are concentrated in two neighborhoods. He says there's a need for homes outside the city limits in rural areas of Montgomery County.

Habitat for Humanity doesn't give away homes for free. A family goes through a screening process. A typical family will have a maximum debt to income ratio of 43%, to help ensure they can make mortgage payments, which are usually \$500 a month or less. Mortgages have a 0% interest rate. A family must be willing to work 400 hours to help Habitat for Humanity in some way. Gregory says the entire process can take two years.

He says a family is usually working, but struggling, often with a single parent as the head of the household. It's not uncommon for that breadwinner to be taking care of elderly parents.

Gregory says volunteers are the work force. They can help with donations, labor or simply buying products at ReStore, which is at 2216 East South Boulevard and features donated items, including antiques and building supplies.

Rotarians can help by cleaning out homes that will be rehabilitated and doing repair work including drywall and flooring. He says people can be assigned to tasks based on age and skill levels. Licensed contractors are used for major plumbing or electrical work.

While former President Jimmy Carter has longtime ties to Habitat for Humanity, he did not found the organization. Gregory reminds us that it was started by Millard Fuller, who had many ties to Alabama. He was born in Lannett, had degrees from Auburn and Alabama and had a wife who was from Tuscaloosa.
